Student Activity Alfred Steer: Responsibility and Justice

Name

Alfred Steer was born May 30, 1913, in Lansdowne, Pennsylvania, the son of Quakers. Alfred served with distinction in the U.S. Navy in the Pacific during World War II before becoming the head of the language division at the International Military Tribunal at Nuremberg, Germany. In his visual history testimony, Alfred shares a number of stories about individuals involved in the Nuremberg trials.
